Govt. Kamla Raja Girls Post Graduate Autonomous College is conveniently situated in a prominent location of south-west Gwalior and having a sprawling campus. Established in 1937 A.D., the College occupies a prominent place and has wide reputation among the institutes of higher education not only in the state of Madhya Pradesh but also in other states of Northern India, because of the academic achievements, the infrastructural properties and the financial richness of the College. The College is affiliated to Jiwaji University, Gwalior and recognized by UGC under section 2(f) and 12(b) of the Act, 1956.

In recognition of its significant achievements, the UGC and the state government granted autonomy to the College in 1996. As an Autonomous College, it has created many opportunities inside for the inclusion of new courses apart from the courses which have already been regularized by the Govt. of Madhya Pradesh. Apart from a good amount of financial aid from the University Grants Commission, New Delhi, it receives twenty lacs as autonomous grant each year for the expenses of Autonomy. The National Assessment and Accreditation Commission awarded the College B grade in 2002 and it is also reaccredited with the grade B in 2010.

The College aims to facilitate and promote studies; research and extension work in the emerging area of higher education with the expansion of women education. It offers courses in disciplines of Arts, Commerce, Management, Computer Science, Science, Home Science and Law. Presently the student strength is 8852. The College has a phenomenal range of 109 qualified regular and 63 guest faculty members. Besides, Commerce and Home Science departments, seventeen undergraduate departments under the faculty of Arts and seven Science departments under the faculty of Science, offer various courses. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. Curricular Aspects:

The Government Kamla Raja Girls Post Graduate Autonomous College is a pioneering and the oldest Institution of women education in the state. As we are determined to provide value education for academic enhancement of girls for sustainable society. We are constantly doing our efforts to convert our motto into action plans by providing excellent educational infrastructure, promoting all round development of girls mentally, physically simultaneously preserving their moral and cultural values.

According to vision and mission, the College sets its specific objectives of implementing the curriculum in the very beginning of the session through Academic Council meeting and time table committees of College as well as individual departments. Besides classroom teaching different departments arrange different activities as per need of curriculum such as talks and discussions, invited lectures of renowned speakers, group discussions, seminars and workshops etc. These activities give exposure to students. Many departments arrange educational tours and excursions, hospitality training in three or five star hotels, visit to industries, laboratories, historical monuments, different NGOs, etc. in support of curricula.

To design and develop the curriculum we follow the instructions and guidelines of Department of Higher Education, M.P. Government. The College has its own Board of Studies for all its departments to design the syllabus for under graduate and post graduate classes. For under graduate classes, the College follows the curriculum designed by the Central Board of Studies, Bhopal. While for post graduate classes syllabi approved by Jiwaji University, Gwalior are followed in our College with maximum 20% permissible expansion. But Music department and Fine arts department of the College frame their curriculum themselves which are also adopted by Jiwaji University. In developing the curriculum, local needs are kept in mind. Accordingly some certificate courses on demand are proposed. All programs follow semester system.

The College has its own board of studies for all the departments to review the syllabus for under graduate and post graduate classes. Each Board of Studies comprises Head and all the regular teaching members of the department, three academic experts as external members, one from Jiwaji University, Gwalior and two from other Universities/College. Essentially one student of that department is also a part of the Board of Studies. This panel evaluates the existing syllabus, discusses the recent developments, improves and approves it. It also goes through the feedback forms filled by students and teachers about the content, relevance and related aspects of the syllabus. We are in a process to incorporate one external expert from industry sector or employment giving sector in our Board of Studies to know their needs and expectations.

Industry, Research Bodies and Civil Societies are involved in the curriculum design and development process. The involvement and interaction with these bodies is done in a well-defined manner. Vivekanand Career and Placement Cell along with Skill Development Cell play a lead role for interaction with Industry sector. Students are regularly visiting research laboratories and research institutions. Many faculty members are a part of professional research bodies and research journals and many are provided with financial assistance in doing research projects.

Many of the faculty members are associated with the university by playing their role in University Administration, Academic Council, College Development Council, Teachers' Welfare Fund Committee and Board of Studies of their own subject as well as interdisciplinary member of other BOS in a skilled manner. Many staff members are chairperson or member of Board of Studies of other Universities /Colleges.

IQAC of the College has framed many cells which actively organize and conduct several activities in addition to departmental activities promoting employability, research and innovation.

To fulfill the needs of the employability, courses like B.B.A., B.C.A., B.A.LLB, PGDCA, Bioinformatics, Microbiology, Biotechnology, Industrial Chemistry, Electronics, etc. have been started and efforts are still continued to cope with the needs of the employment market. Career and Placement fairs are organized in the College every year. Short term learning programs for skill development, preparation of competitive examinations such as Bank examination, CAT / MAT, NET / SET, etc. are also organized regularly in the College.

A research oriented platform 'Discussion Forum' has been constituted in the College which promotes multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary academic activities for students as well as teachers. The outstanding achievements and contributions of staff members are recognized and honored by this platform periodically.

The College is actively involved in research. Fourteen departments of this College are recognized as research centers. Many major/minor research projects have been completed successfully while several are being carried out by faculty members. The College also publishes Creative Discourse a triennial International Peer Reviewed Research Journal.

We are having all the streams Humanities, Science, Commerce, Management, Law, Home Science and Performing Arts for the all-round development of the students.At UG level we are running B.A., B.Sc., B.Sc. (Home Science), B.Com., B.Com. with computer, B.B.A., B.C.A. and B.A.LLB. Ten combinations are running in B.A. with the subjects Dance, Sanskrit, Sociology, Drawing & Painting, History, Psychology, Economics, Geography, English, Mathematics, Hindi, Functional Hindi, Music-Vocal, Music-Instrumental, Home-Science, Philosophy, Political Science and Urdu. In B.Com. two combinations B.Com. and B.Com. with Computer Application while in B.Sc. eleven combinations are running.

At PG level 22 Syllabi are running in Social Sciences, Commerce, Science, Home Science and Performing Arts. One year diploma course PGDCA is also running in the College.

Among above courses / subjects B.A.LLB, B.COM. with Computer Application, B.B.A., B.C.A., Biotechnology, Microbiology, Industrial Chemistry, Computer Science, Electronics, Bioinformatics and PGDCA are running successfully under selffinancing scheme.

Value added courses such as Entrepreneurship Development, Environmental Studies, Languages Hindi and English spoken in this area, Computer Knowledge and Moral Values are incorporated in the syllabi of Foundation Course which is compulsory in each semester for all student whether from Science, Arts or Commerce streams. Students are encouraged to join at least one among NCC, NSS or Sports which are actively running in the College.

The College has developed the mechanism of getting the feedback in open sessions as well as through forms filled by the students regarding different aspects including curriculum. The feedback obtained is discussed, analyzed and utilized in the meetings of Board of Studies to be held next year.

2. Teaching-Learning and Evaluation:

College provides education in various disciplines including Languages (Hindi, English, Urdu, Sanskrit,) Humanities (History, Political Science, Sociology. Geography, Economics) Commerce and Science (Life science, Mathematics, Home Science), Law and some job oriented subjects (Biotechnology, Microbiology, Bioinformatics, Computer Science, BCA, PGDCA). Recently 5 Certificate Courses have been proposed to provide students extra cutting edge required to be employable. Admission process is online adhering completely to norms as framed by Dept. of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P. Admission process is transparent well administered complying with the rules and norms laid down by Deptt. of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P. The entire admission process is reviewed and improved every year. College uses diverse media to give publicity. All-important notices and information are displayed in web-sites www.highereducation.mp.nic.in and www.krgcgwalior.org. Due weightage is given to candidates belonging to SC, ST, OBC and differently abled categories. Due consideration is also given to students who participated in sports and represented their organization in state/national level. Equal Opportunity Cell and teachers in their personal capacity provide ample support to economically deprived and under privileged students.

The Institution organizes orientation program for freshers every year. In this program Institution showcases its glorious past and enlightened future with its mission and vision. They are well informed about the tradition, culture and discipline of the Institution. Departments of English and Hindi make special efforts to help freshers to achieve a smooth transition from school environment to higher education sector. Academic calendar is prepared before the academic session begins. Course outline, content and tentative schedule is provided to students which enables them to get an idea what they are going to be taught.

Teaching excellence is considered as strength of the College. The approach to educational process involving teaching-learning and evaluation, is multipronged. Institution envisages a shift from teacher centric to learner centric pedagogy, a journey not a destination. College follows multifaceted learning process which includes experimental and collaborative learning process along with routine lectures and remedial classes. All the departments have internet/computer facilities and optimum use of ICT (smart classes, flip classes, online learning resources, use of softwares for teaching) is assured. All these methods not only enhance academic values of the content but also contribute significantly to overall personality development of student. We create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among students through various academic and co-curricular activities.

College recognizes and incentivizes the outstanding performance of students in academics, sports and other co-curricular activities. These students are given cash prizes and gold medals. Top ranked students are conferred Gold medals. An Institutionalized mentoring program ascertains that students' academic progression and personal problems are solved.

College has good number of qualified experienced teachers to handle all courses. College encourages and foster teacher excellence and to this end they are motivated to participate in training and capacity building programs. Most of them are also invited as member/subject expert in Board of Studies or as resource person in other Institutions to share their experience, knowledge and contributions. They are also encouraged to engage research activities of various trends.

College has introduced effective mechanism to monitor teaching quality. A committee constituted by Principal and representative from office of Additional Director, visit all departments periodically and give suggestions. Tutorial and remedial classes are also organized in all departments. There is provision of coaching classes for aspirants who wish to appear in competitive examinations. Curriculum is updated in Board of Studies.

Institution has set up independent Autonomous Cell with efficient staff and required facilities. The Principal is chief coordinator who is assisted by team of 13 members. The continuous evaluation system is in practice which includes various modes (written tests, writing assignment, seminar presentation, etc.). There is centralized valuation system of answer books. Some of the valued answer books are reviewed by expert/chairperson of the subject. Results are uploaded in College web-site. Photocopy of valued answer books are made available to the students who apply within stipulated time.

C. Research, Consultancy and Extension:

Govt. K.R.G. Post Gradute Autonomous College gives paramount importance to promote various research activities. IQAC and Research Committee of the College take the quality initiative to publicize the facilities and resources available and disseminate research culture in the College and encourage and monitor the research activities in all the twenty regular Departments in which fourteen are research centres and six are self financing departments. IQAC made a separate provision in the budget for Research every year. The committee monitors the schemes and plans of different agencies and motivates faculty members to take up different research and academic activities. Faculty members and PhD students are informed and encouraged to avail about the various fellowships. The College leaves no stone unturned when it comes to trilogy of Research, Extension and Collaboration activities.

Research Activities

The College released seed money to organize seminars and workshops.

Rs. 60,000 in 2010-11, Rs.1,00000 in 2011-12 Rs.,1,00000 in 2012-13,Rs. 3,80000 in 2013-14 and Rs.7,45,000 in 2014-15 respectively to promote Research. The College has also proposed the release of seed money for research projects in the current session.

The IQAC and Research Development Cell successfully published 3 issues of Peer Reviewed International Research Journal Creative Discourse- ISSN No: 2348-9979 (triennial). This journal is considered as a turning point for providing road map for clear cut research activities. In this journal many of our faculties have published research articles, book reviews, research findings, data compilation and analysis. At present there are 20 ongoing projects, 27 projects are submitted since 2010, are financed by UGC, ICHR and MPCST. Three major projects are completed and two are ongoing. Total amount received for research projects is Rs. 93,92,600/-.

38 Conferences, Seminars and Workshops are organized in College since 2010. Institution gets funds from IQAC Cell of the College and different agencies like UGC, & MPCST. 274 eminent guests and scholars delivered extension lectures. 2017 Conferences, Seminars and Workshops are attended by the faculty of the Institution.

A number of teachers have presented research papers in State, National and International conferences, seminars and symposiums. Mention may be made of Dr. D.S. Rathore, Dr. R. K. Mahor, Dr. Sandhya Pandey who have presented papers in conferences held at Mauritus, Nepal, Bangkok, Srilanka, Bhutan, etc., Dr. B.P.Sati, was also selected in the Central University, Izol, Mizoram University in 2012 due to his research achievements and joined there as a Professor.

39 published books, 9 edited books, 9 chapters and many articles in National and International Journals, Anthologies and Books have also been published. Nearly 40% of the total Research papers published have impact factor ranging from 0 to 5. Inter departmental/Inter disciplinary research projects have been undertaken by the faculties.115 PhD's are awarded and 239 are ongoing in the College. It is noteworthy in spite of being UG department, HOD of Psychology department has produced twenty PhD's and 16 candidates are doing research under him at present. Faculty of the College is approved guides in other universities also. Research awards and recognition from different reputed agencies are received by the faculty.

Extension Activities

The environment of the College gives several opportunities to students to understand their social responsibilities and students with teachers are engaged in different activities to promote this spirit. NCC (2 units and 320 cadets), NSS (3 units and 342 cadets), Red Ribbon club (100 members) Red Cross, Women Development Cell, Equal Opportunity Cell are different forums to track students involvement in different social activities. Many teachers and students are honoured by the awards for social extension activities. Students formed clubs like JAGRITI, Girls Power, SAKHI, TULIKA, PRAYAS to do social activities. Students of Home Science Department took an active part in survey conducted by the Department of Women and Child Development, M.P. Govt. to find out causes of prevailing malnutrition in village Khori, Karhal Vikas khand, Distt.Sheopur (M.P.). NSS has adopted one Village Mahalgaon and Mahadji Scindia Basti and undertake various activities for their upliftment. Gandhi Jayanti, Vivekanad Jayanti, Ambedkar Jayanti, Anti Drugs Campaigns, Programmes on Female Foeticide, Save Girl Child, Breast Feeding Week, Anti Tobacco Rallies, Plantation Campaigns, Water Conservation Awareness, Blood Donation Camps, Traffic Awareness rallies, Literacy Week, Self Defence programmes for girls, AIDS Awareness, SVEEP programmes are some of the frequently organized programmes which are conducted by the College every year. The students get more exposure by participating in such extension activities and relate themselves to society.

Collaboration

The College is an examination center for many competitive examinations. A number of collaborations have been entered into with various Institutions and NGOs. The institution provides free of cost consultancy services wherever possible and honorary advice and consultancy is provided by Faculty members to the society. Home Science Department gives consultancy in Diet and Nutrition and on Child development, Career Counseling Cell provides consultancy related to job and Career, History and Fine Arts department on Heritage buildings conservation and their protection, Commerce Department of the College provides consultancy related to Income Tax, Women Development Cell gives consultancy related to Women issues, Law department is providing legal aid to the students and staff. Other departments are also giving consultancy. Teachers from the Institution sent on Deployment by the State Government in other Government Colleges of the State. College has been selected by Department of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P. as one of the twelve Colleges for collaboration with national and International agencies.

The College has benefited academically and financially because of its collaborations with agencies like UGC, MPCST, ICHR, Jiwaji University, etc. Experts from different Universities and Colleges are nominated in Board of Studies play a significant role in curricular development and our students also visit for their research and training in many reputed institutions and students from other institutions come here to use laboratories. The collaboration with them has impacted the visibility, identity and diversity in activities on the campus.

Apart from all these activities many Faculty Members of our College are regularly writing articles and poems in various National Magazines and News Papers. They are also involved in Creative Writing. Some are visiting All India Radio and Doordarshan frequently. Stories of few members are translated in regional languages also.

Research, Institutional social responsibilities and Consultancy is a paving path for future development in the Institution.

4. Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

Infrastructure and Learning Resources in an Institute play a pivotal role in carrying out the educational programs effectively and efficiently. The College has developed infrastructure and learning resources with the financial assistance provided by UGC, Autonomy and Janbhagidari Samittee. The available infrastructure of the College adequately meets the requirements of the stake holders. The College campus is sprawled over 13 acres and has 6 faculties Commerce, Management, Humanities, Science, Home Science and Law provided with 52 classrooms and 41 laboratories which are optimally used by these faculties. All the departments have separate staff room and wash room.

Enhancement of infrastructural facilities has been a constant effort of the College to keep up, encourage and achieve academic excellence. The learning facility is augmented by 10 smart classrooms which are used for ICT based teaching and learning as well as to organize extension lectures and special lectures. Each teaching department has computer and internet facility to assist ICT based teaching and learning. The entire College campus has been provided with Wi-Fi facility. Students are continuously encouraged and motivated to make use of internet as a learning resource. Teaching resources are supplemented by various softwares and online study materials.

An air conditioned conference room is available with Microphones and upgraded ICT facility where the meetings of statutory bodies like Governing Body, Academic Council and IQAC are held. Administrative blocks and offices have adequate computers and internet facility to carry out administrative work proficiently. Admissions and fees deposition are online process. Majority of the transactions take place electronically. Head of the various departments are connected through whatsapp and office communicates with the departments through e-mail. The College is linked online with higher offices of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P.. All the classrooms, library and most of the corridors are covered with CCTV Cameras. Biometric facility is installed in the office.

A seminar hall is equipped with ICT facility is available to organise national seminars, symposiums, workshops, lectures and other academic activities and administrative meetings. The Auditorium has seating capacity of 1000 students is used for major cultural events and intercollegiate competitions conducted throughout the year and all the academic activities like National Conferences when needed.

College has a rich sports department and the sports facilities include a fully-equipped Gymnasium, A Basket ball ground (30×19 Sq.Mts.), a Lawn tennis court (30×24 Sq.Mts.) and Play Ground with a lawn and total area is 54×32 Sq.Mts where Kabaddi, kho-kho, Cricket is played. A variety of outdoor and indoor games are practiced being played and practiced in the College. Cultural activities include organization of Inter Class Competition for around 22 events. Every year Youth Festival is organized as scheduled by department of Higher Education, Govt. of Madhya Pradesh.

Library offers traditional learning as well as e-learning resources and has 102892 books and nearly 100 subscribed journals on various subjects which is sufficiently fulfils the requirements of staff and students. The library Advisory Committee appraises the needs of the users and proposes plans to be executed for up gradation of the library. The library has automation facility (SOUL 2.0 Software). The users can have access to the collection using computer systems through OPAC which provide information regarding availability status, issue status, etc. E-library is equipped with 10 computers and INFLIBNET facility is available to access 80,000 e-books and 2500 e-journals in different disciplines like Science, Commerce and Humanities and other online learning resources. The library also provides other e-learning resources like CDs in different disciplines. Students belonging to SC&ST categories are entitled to obtain stationary and books free of cost under Govt. Schemes (Book Bank).

Residential facility for students is available in the premises. There are three hostels with intake capacity of 200-225 girls. Hostel has Dining hall, Washing facilities, Telephone, Medical facility is available for the resident students. News Papers and magazines are provided and Wi-Fi facility is also available.

Ramps and railings have been constructed to avoid any inconvenience to the differently abled students. A wheel chair is available in the College to be used by these students when needed.

There are 5 gardens in the College and every effort is made by the College to maintain the greenery in the premises. There are 3 bore wells and 13 overhead tanks in the College which ensure adequate water supply. Rain water harvesting technique has been introduced in the College as ecofriendly endeavour.

5. Students Support and Progression:

The College is extending mentoring support to the students. A fix number of students are assigned to the department wise mentors. The freshers are given comprehensive understanding of the working of the College through a 10 days orientation programme.

The College takes pride in facilitating and providing personal enhancement for the students. The activities for interaction with the students on career related issues are given priority throughout the academic session. Swami Vivekanand Career Guidance Cell, Placement Cell and Personality Development Cell work meticulously for their guidance.

The College has its own website www.krgcgwalior.org which is updated and has a dynamic bilingual structure with all the relevant information necessary for the students.

The College students receive State Government scholarships under Gaon ki Beti, Pratibha Kiran and Avagaman Suvidha Yojna. The students from SC/ST/OBC section of society get fee concession as scholarships on their eligibility ground. They also receive special training program for their self employment. Our College gives 2% weightage in admission to the differently abled students. The College ensures that infrastructural facilities meet the requirement of these students.

The College has concerns for the girls' wellbeing. Particular attention is given to their blood profile with special reference with special reference to anemia. The College conducts health camps, eye camps and dental check up camps for the students.

The students are encouraged to take civil services and other competitive examinations. Good library facilities are provided to the students. Every department has a provision for a wall magazine on which students are encouraged to display their creativity and share their concern on the burning issues.

The College has a very strong track record in sports, NSS and NCC. Our students represent the College at National and International level. The Students get advantage of getting selected into various Defence and Police services.

The College has a Student Grievance Redressal Cell, Sexual Harassment Cell and Anti-raging Cell which include the representatives of the students and work effectively to provide best possible solution to the problems of students.

The College awards Gold medals to the students for their academic performance and extracurricular activity. The College has relatively low dropout rate. The girls often come back and continue their courses after getting married.

The College has a systematic method of attaining feedback from the regular students and staff members for the qualitative improvement. The College Alumni Association plays a significant role in the development of the College.

The College does not have a student council since last three years as per the order of the Government but the students participate in various committees and clubs. They give their full cooperation in decision making process of the College. Our College is proud to be one of the premier institutions for girl education and strives hard to fulfill our vision.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management:

The College is committed to all round development of the students with a vision to "To provide value education for academic enhancement of girls for sustainable society." In the leadership of the principal a well-knit system of governance is operational in the institute where authority and responsibility is delegated to staff thus while discharging their duties every member of the staff gets ample opportunity to develop quality of leadership.

Institution encourages students and staff members including non-teaching staff for participation in various inter and intra institutional activities. On various occasions and meetings the institute interact with stakeholders, take their opinion for due consideration. College management always gives due respect to suggestions regarding development and leadership of the College given by stakeholders like students, teachers, non-teaching staff, parents, alumni, etc. and it is always encouraging.

College promotes a culture of participative management. The Principal plays a leading role in governance of the College constituting different Committees, Cells and Clubs involving the staff members for the proper execution of plans. Good number of the women faculty participate in decision making and management. The Principal and the convener of the various committees actively take part in the working of the College administration. Participative management includes Academic, Administration, Examination, Finance management.

College is affiliated to Jiwaji University, Gwalior and it provides leadership both academic administrative, to the faculty members by member/convener/chairman in different academic and administrative bodies of the College such as Governing Body, Academic Council, Board of Studies and IQAC.

The College has evolved strategy for knowledge management. A panel of expertise of each subject is approved by the Board of Studies and invited to deliver guest lectures. Retired professors deliver guest and extension lectures for betterment of knowledge of the students under PRATIBHA BANK scheme. Senior and meritorious students give guidance to the junior students. E-library and Network Resource Centre give facility to the faculty and students to access web knowledge.

The Review committee of University Grants Commission for extension of Autonomy has visited the Institution in March 2015 and on the basis of the recommendation of Review committee UGC has extended our Institution's autonomous status till 2021.

Development of teaching and learning is ensured through infrastructure improvement thereby creating an environment that helps in teaching learning process. Upgradation of the existing program and introduction of new courses and subjects is given emphasis. Promoting ICT based teaching and learning and provision of E-library is another means adopted for teaching and learning. Introduction of new skill based certificate courses are always given consideration.

The College is aware to develop research ability among the faculty members and research scholars. Fourteen Post Graduate departments of the College are recognized by Jiwaji University, Gwalior as research centers. Academic departments and teachers are encouraged for organizing seminar, workshop and conferences. An international peer reviewed journal 'Creative Discourse' is started from July, 2014 for promoting research work. More than twenty research projects funded by various agencies. The College encourages to the departments for MOU with research Institutions, national and international industries. The College nominated renowned persons from industries as member of IQAC and plans to propose representation of industrialists in Board of Studies which may help in framing curriculum on the basis of local industrial need. The College administration encourages the faculty to participate in international seminars, workshops and conferences. Volunteers of NSS and cadets of NCC have represented College at International platform. Athletes' have participated at International meet.

The targets of community engagement are achieved by the units of NCC, NSS, Red Cross Society, Equal Opportunity and Ethical Excellence Cells. Some of the targets are women rights program, drinking water and awareness of health hygiene and Health Check-up camps.

The College has established the IQAC in May, 2006 for measuring post accreditation quality assurance. The IQAC of the College has its own system to review the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society. Academic Audit Cell of IQAC conducts annual academic audit of the departments. This audit is done with the analysis of targets and achievements regarding curriculum, research development, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

7. Innovations and Best Practices:

The innovative/best practices of the College reflect its constant quest for excellence which is facilitated by the vision and active role played by IQAC. Dynamic components of IQAC have helped College to achieve its mission of providing holistic education to more than 8000 students for perfection on all scores.

1.1 CURRICULAM DESIGN AND DEVELOPMENT

Our mission is dynamic and its tasks are well defined which make the Institution characteristic not only in this region, state but all over the nation. According to our vision and mission, academic programs and activities are decided. First these are communicated to the stakeholders.

Action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum according to vision and mission

The Department of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P. provides academic calendar to all Government Colleges which all the Colleges have to follow. The College sets its specific objectives of implementing the curriculum in the very beginning of the session first through Academic council meeting, where the mechanism for effective implementation of different goals is discussed.

- The College time - table committee prepares the College time - table.
- Departmental time table committees determine the workload, allocate work and prepare departmental time -table.
- Teachers prepare teaching plans of allocated work and maintain detailed teacher diary and students' attendance register which is regularly monitored by Head of the department, Academic Audit Cell and Principal.
- Departments undertake educational tours and excursions, arrange talks and discussions.
- Visits to Industries and Laboratories are also organized by some departments such as Industrial chemistry, Economics and Commerce according to need of the curriculum and students have to submit their report.
- History department undertakes visit to some historical monument and students of the department have to submit dissertation on that.
- Home Science department arranges visits for students of M.Sc. (Human Development) to numerous centres such as 'Atma Jyoti Sanstha', 'Ehsas' Institute for disabled persons, 'MadhavAndhashram', 'Roshni', etc. according to need of curriculum of special papers, 'Children and Person of Disability' and 'Early Childhood Care'.
- M.Sc. (Resource Management) I sem. students attend Bonsai training for one week, II sem. Students study consumer in the market by doing market survey and M.Sc. III sem. Students attend Hospitality Training for one month either in three star or five star hotels.
- Project activities related to curriculum are held to complete the prescribed syllabus.
- Renowned external experts are invited to deliver special lectures in each semester in every department which further enrich the knowledge of students and give them opportunity to interact with experts other than their own teachers.
- Departments also organize workshops for students related to curriculum which are further helpful in enhancing students' skill.

1.1.2 Describe the mechanism used in the design and development of the curriculum? Give details on the process. (Need assessment, Feedback etc.)

The curriculum at the under graduate levels has been designed by the Central Board of Studies, Bhopal and it is being followed in our Institution as per guidelines of the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P.

The College has its own board of studies for all its departments to design the syllabus for under graduate and post graduate classes whether going on regular or under self-finance schemes. The curriculum design and development is done through well-defined process according to guidelines for autonomous Colleges. Usually syllabi approved by Jiwaji University, Gwalior are followed in our College with permissible expansionupto 20%. Music department and Fine arts department of the College frame their curriculum themselves which are also adopted by Jiwaji University. The Home Science department follows the curriculum designed by the Central Board of Studies, Bhopal with permissible changes.

In developing the curriculum, local needs are kept in mind. On demand of students some certificate courses such as

- Basics of Food Science and Food Processing
- Concepts and Applications of Bioinformatics
- Travel and Tourism Management
- Plant Tissue Culture
- Geetanjali (Certificate course in Vocal Music),

etc. are approved by Academic Council and going to start in coming session.

In framing our Board of Studies for different departments, besides Head and all members of the department, three academic experts renowned in their field are also incorporated as external members, one from Jiwaji University and two from other university/College. The Board of Studies is effective for two years. Necessarily, one student from respective department is also a member of Board of Studies.

This panel evaluates the existing syllabus, discusses the recent developments. It also goes through the feedback forms filled by students and teachers about the content, relevance and related aspects of the syllabus.

We are in a process to incorporate one external expert from industry sector or employment giving sector in our Board of Studies to know their needs and expectations so that our students may get expertise in required field for placement.

So we take representation from diverging fields in framing the Board of Studies.

1.1.3 How does the College involve industry, research bodies and civil society in the curriculum design and development process? How did the College benefit through the involvement of the stakeholders?

The students and teaching faculty interact with industry, research bodies and civil society in many ways and these interactions are utilized in the curriculum design and development process.

Institution enriches and organizes the curriculum to enhance the experiences of students to cope with the needs of the employment market. According to the needs, courses like BBA, BCA, BALLB, PGDCA, Bio-informatics, Microbiology, Biotechnology, Industrial Chemistry, Electronics, etc. have been started and efforts are still continued to cope with the needs of the employment market.

For professional skill enhancement, invited lectures, workshops are organized such as training program for law students involving Honorable Justice from High Court, president of MP High Court Bar Association, senior advocates, etc., Lecture by senior scientist from regional forensic laboratory etc.

Students from Biotechnology and Microbiology departments join other organizations in semester break to enrich their knowledge.

Students from Home Science go for a six month dietetic training (dietetic intern) after appearing in M.Sc. (Food and Nutrition) IV semester in various hospitals like AIIMS, Bombay Hospital Indore, PGI Lucknow, Apollo Hospital New Delhi, etc. which help them in acquiring employment.

Innovation:

IQAC of the College has framed many cells which organize and conduct several activities in addition to departmental activities to promote research and innovation.

c. Courses offered in modular form:

The College conducts many certificate programs time to time under different heads. These programs take shape in the very beginning of the session in staff council meetings and brought to the knowledge of students through slides running on electronic notice boards, information pasted on notice boards. The certificate courses which we are going to start have been designed in modular form.

d. Credit transfer and accumulation facility:

There is no such facility in the rules given by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P.

e. Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programs and courses:

A student with science subjects at higher secondary level seeking admission in graduation may join science, commerce or arts, with commerce at higher secondary level may join commerce or arts, with arts at higher secondary level may join arts only.

At post-graduation level, on completion of graduation degree in a particular discipline a student has the option of pursuing the post graduate program in any of the subjects opted at undergraduate level. She may also go for PG program in some applied subject if the core subject has been studied in graduation.

Again a student from science or commerce streams may choose any subject from arts for PG program.

Of course, while moving across programs, a deduction of five percent is made in marks obtained in qualifying examination while making the merit list.

No, such courses have not been developed for International students exclusively. In running courses 85% seats are reserved for candidates from M.P. as per instructions of M.P. Higher Education Department and 15% are open to all. However no International student has sought admission to College.

At UG level, the College follows the curricula developed by the Department of Higher Education, M.P. but the syllabi of Music, Fine arts and Bioinformatics are framed and revised by the respective departments keeping in mind the utility, demand and relevance of the program.

At PG level, the College being an autonomous College, we can add and modify the syllabus up to 20%. In the meetings of Board of Studies held by each department, the existing syllabi are analyzed and modified according to their applicability, relevance and employability.

Entrepreneurship Development, Environmental Studies, Languages Hindi and English spoken in this area, Computer Knowledge and Moral Values are incorporated in the syllabi of Foundation Course which is compulsory in each semester for each student whether from Science. Arts or Commerce streams. As Foundation Course is compulsory, each and every student gets

benefitted. Students are encouraged to join at least one activity among NCC, NSS or Sports which are actively running in the College.

Has the College introduced any higher order skill development programs in consonance with the national requirements as outlined by the National **Skills Development Corporation and other agencies?**

The College follows the curricula and Instructions laid by Higher Education Department of M.P. and UGC which are state and national agencies devoted to enhance the skills of our students.

Vivekanand Career and Placement cell conducts many programs such as Computer training program, Textile Designing, Tailoring, Beauty Culture, Food Preservation, Hasta Shilpa Prashikshan etc. to enhance the skills of our students.

For skill development of students, M.P. Government has signed MOU with VTP (Vocational Training Provider) for Kaushal Vikas Prashikshan of students. VTPs are going to give training tostudents in the Colleges of M.P.

- Strictly follows merit and reservation policy.

- Admission process is phase-wise and off line opportunity is also available to registered candidates in the last phase.

Publicity:

All aspects and stages of the admission procedure are duly notified through various means i.e. print, electronic media, notice boards, etc. Information is also shared on social sites (Facebook and Whats App) by stake holders. Before 2012, online admission was not in practice, the College used to ensure wide publicity through College prospectus which contained all required information about courses, fee structure, etc.

Institutional Website:

The College has developed its own website which is fully functional and updated regularly. It is informative and user friendly provides all information related to the admission policy, academic programmes, academic calendar, biodata of the faculty, fees and scholarships to all stakeholders.

Print media:

Local newspapers play an important role in propagating the information regarding admission process by publishing important dates, status of vacant seats, courses offered; also publish notes on relevant jobs opportunities in various courses.

College Notice Boards:

Important dates/events/status/courses offered, eligibility and other details are displayed on departmental and digital notice board of the College.

Programs:

College also organizes various programs to enhance GER which is an important component of our Mission and to publicize its admission policy and programs:

- College chalo Abhiyan (College Chalo Movement) Deptt. of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P. has initiated this special drive to stimulate GER in Higher Education. College organizes formal/informal meetings with various Govt./Pvt./Public feeder schools and shares its plans and progress to attract students of various strata.
- College also organizes a program INSPIRATION where our senior students act as ambassador and share their experiences of the alma mater, with students and encourage them to peruse their studies in this prestigious Girls College. Interactive session of Alumni with freshers/ young buds to guide and enlighten their future, are also organized.

Ours is a multidisciplinary Girls College, offering plethora of courses. Aspirants from diverse background seek admission in this College. It has always been the first choice by the students with excellent academic credentials as well as the first generation learners from disadvantaged sections of society.

Admission to first semester undergraduate and postgraduate students is an on line process, controlled and monitored by Department of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P. Admission process is completed in 3 phases - Registration. Verification and Fee deposition.

14 out of 20 depts. provide research facility to 239 PhD scholars. A written test is conducted by University, Candidates who qualify this test appear in interview and after declaration of result these selected candidates complete their Course Work in various departments. They appear before RDC and finally admitted in PhD course.

2.1.3 Does the College have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, the institution has mechanism to review the admission process and the student profile. Admission committees are constituted for all faculties. All appropriate and required information is provided to admission seekers/their parents/guardians.

- Admission process is discussed and reviewed in meetings.
- Feedback (Formal/informal) is obtained from students and parents.
- After admission process is over, detailed information about each student which includes percent marks in previous examinations', category/cast, rural/urban, Contact Address, etc., is compiled, and database is prepared and maintained.
- Students are guided, supported and encouraged to pursue their hobbies and also to take up new extracurricular activities.
- Records of students who bring laurels to the institution are maintained, they are groomed and rewarded.
- Analysis of feedback helps us to improve and smoothen our activities. Accordingly we redesign our C.C.E. mode, curricula, introduce new courses, career program, etc.

As an outcome we have been able to enhance GER, produce brighter, talented citizens, entrepreneurs and professionals for future.

Help center, at the time of admission is established to assist students and their guardians.

SC/ST:

There is 15% and 7.5% reservation respectively for SC and ST students. Students also receive financial support in the form of scholarship. They are also given course books material and stationary as per Govt. norms.

OBC:

For OBC students 27.5% seats are reserved. State Govt. also provide financial support to eligible students.in form of scholarship.

Women:

Ours is a girls College, imparting education to girls since 1937. It has all infrastructure requirements like Hostel, Common room, Changing room and Sick room, etc. The schemes and structures such as Pratibha Kiran Yojna, Grievance Redressal Cell, Women Development Cell, and Sexual Harassment Cell have been put in place. College also focusses on program/events/schemes to promote girls education.

Differently Abled Students:

3 percent seats are reserved in all courses. Relaxation of 5% marks is also given to students. College encourages differently able students to pursue their studies and support them various ways:

- Equal Opportunity Cell has been constituted which organizes periodical meetings and counselling sessions with these students, maintain their records to inspire and enlighten their path.
- Committee also obtains and analyzes feedback from them and their parents.
- College has procured wheel chair, and ramps with railings have been constructed.

Analysis has been made on the basis of the data during last 4 years. (2010-14). Following trends are visible:

- For all courses College has earned good reputation over last many years. General trend in increase in Demand ratio is indicator of higher GER.
- For commerce stream (UG/PG) the demand ratio is quite high.
- For humanities stream, there is slight decline in demand ratio.

- In science stream, some courses are showing positive trends. However B.Sc. with vocational subject is preferred over regular B.Sc.
- B.C.A./P.G.D.C.A. courses have been showing a gradual increase over last 4 years.
- The demand ratio was quite high in P.G. courses (Commerce, Mathematics and Literature). In the current session 10% seats were added in all these subjects as per direction given by the Deptt. of Higher Education after seeking permission from Chairman, Janbhagidari Samiti, which could accommodate only small number of students from waiting list.

The high demand ratio for all courses is also indicative of the quality of teaching-learning offered at Govt. K.R.G Post Graduate Autonomous College.

Yes, all departments schedule remedial classes in their teaching Time Table and maintain record. To fill the gap in knowledge among students coming from different backgrounds and streams, teachers interact with individual students and give extra time to bridge the gap. Subjects are taught in both English and Hindi language. Following Certificate Courses (add on) courses of 6 months duration are being proposed:

- Basics of Food Science and Food Processing
- Concepts and Applications of Bioinformatics
- Travel and Tourism Management
- Plant Tissue Culture
- Geetanjali (certificate course in vocal music)

Has the College conducted a study on the incremental academic growth of different categories of students; - student from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically handicapped and slow learners, etc.? If yes, give details on how the study has helped the College to improve the performance of these students.

The admissions are based on norms stipulated by the Deptt. of Higher education, Govt. of M.P. Seats are reserved for different categories of students. After admission, mentors and subject teachers guide students in all academic and non-academic matters.

A special cell named Equal Opportunity Cell is functional to cater the special needs of SC/ST and differently abled students. They are motivated to attend remedial classes. Subject teachers monitor the progress of students which helps

to improve their performance. Equal Opportunity Cell also extends all possible help to students belonging to economically deprived.

Advanced learners are inspired to interact and help their classmates. (SAMARDDHI PROGRAM). College teachers and administrative staff are sensitive towards these students and their problems are solved on priority basis.

They are also provided study materials, old question papers, question banks and books. Interactive sessions with Professional Psychologist are also arranged to address general and specific social, professional and individual issues. Library and Career Counseling Cell manage exclusive time slot for these students. Performance of these students is analyzed after exams and further curative steps are taken, if required.

How does the institution identify and respond to the learning needs of 2.2.5 advanced learners?

Advanced learners are spotted in the merit list at the time of admission by the admission committee. Teachers in the class also identify advanced learners on the basis of their performance in various class tests, C.C.E. and other interactive sessions. These students are encouraged to achieve a higher degree of excellence through participation and presentation in various seminars, competitions etc.

- They are asked to assist their classmates in various ways. (SAMARDDHI PROGRAM)
- Meritorious students are accommodated in various committees like IQAC, BOS, magazine and Library committees, etc.
- Special attention is also given by subject teachers/mentors. They help them to procure good reference books and study material.
- They are motivated to attend extension lectures in other institutes, etc.
- Meritorious students who belong to weaker sections are taken special care.
- Central library and Career Counseling Cell are enriched with good books, journals, newspapers so that advance learners can be benefitted.
- For them coaching facilities of multiple nature are also arranged in the College campus.
- It is the tradition of the College that every individual who is endowed with exemplary merit, skill and talent are recognized and honored. They are honored in annual prize distribution ceremony. Their achievements are recognized and certificates are given to them. Top ranked students are conferred Gold medals. Awards have also been instituted by eminent persons of the society. These activities also serve to motivate others to strive for academic excellence.

2.2.6 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

College admits, accommodates and encourages differently able students to pursue the course of their choice. College follows student's friendly policies and helps these students in formal/informal ways.

- Seats for these students are reserved as per Govt. norms.
- College building has ramps with railing.
- Provides wheel chairs for their movement.
- Differently abled students are given every assistance during examination as per Govt. rules/norms.
- Attendance requirement is also relaxed depending upon the case.
- Various components of IQAC organize programs to overcome learning barriers, workshops on personality development, positive thinking and self-confidence.
- Concern teacher also provide necessary subject specific assistance.
- A toilet has been constructed for such students.
- A group Saheli of 20 students has been formed which assists these students voluntarily whenever and wherever they need help.
- Books and other study materials are procured from various sources for these students.

2.3 **Teaching-Learning Process**

In today's time learning process has changed. Chalk duster method of yesterday is not considered complete and effective. Students are not passive learners; want to learn knowledge interaction and collaboration. Moreover, learning is understood as a process rather than a product. IT and ICT have profound effect on Teaching Learning Process. Keeping these ground realities in mind, the teaching-learning process at the College is constantly monitored and improved for betterment to the satisfaction of the most important stakeholders.

How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and 2.3.1 evaluation Schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)

Deptt. of Higher education, Govt. of M.P. designs academic calendar for each semester. It insists on minimum 90 working days per semester. It also provides calendar of examination, sports, other important events and semester breaks.

College in general follows unified syllabus framed by the central co-ordination committee for U.G. classes. For P.G. classes, College follow the syllabus designed by the Jiwaji University, Gwalior in different subjects. Autonomy is viewed as an opportunity to bring qualitative changes in syllabi. BOS in different subjects, is organized in mid-June, every year, well in advance, before

new academic session commences. Members of BOS review, discuss quality of content of syllabus. Suggestions and recommendations are incorporated to make it more relevant and updated.

Teaching Plan: The detailed layout of the teaching plan is offered in academic calendar. Departments also prepare a phase wise teaching plan and time schedule for the completion of the particular chapters. This enables students to know the portion to be learnt during a particular phase and also help teachers to frame time span for teaching and to fix the dates for other events.

Teachers ensure that students are keeping pace with the contents which are being taught and getting sufficient time to learn it. Head/Mentors discuss the progress with respective teachers and mid-term corrections are also taken into considerations. Teachers maintain daily dairies where day to day activities related to teaching-learning process are recorded. It is regularly monitored and checked by Heads/Co-coordinators. Monitoring Committee and Principal also verify these diaries at the end of the each month. Higher authorities also visit departments and review the progress.

Evaluation Blue print: Examination Cell of the College prepares the time frame for various events like C.C.E., end semester examinations, evaluation of answer books, declaration of the results and other related activities. It also coordinates with IQAC so that no other activities collide. Students are well informed about the time schedule of Internal and External Exams. The systematic planning and execution, results in successful completion of all exams. All phases of examination are planned and executed in a rational, realistic and scientific manner.

2.3.2 Does the College provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the Commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

Yes,

- Course outlines are made available on Departmental notice boards and web-sites www.krgcgwalior.org, www.highereducation.mp.gov.in.
- The students also receive syllabus for subjects for each semester from the teacher.
- The contents of syllabus are written in Hindi and English, as well. The contents are well divided in units
- Copy of the syllabus made available in all departments, central library and in offices of Autonomy cell and IQAC.
- Students are given information about course outline in orientation classes.

Mentors and subject teachers share information about content of syllabus with the students.

2.3.3 What are the courses, which predominantly follow the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what are the other methods of learning experiences provided to students?

All most all the courses predominantly follow lecture method. The College as whole and individual teachers also adopts other methods to enhance the effectiveness of teaching.

Teaching is made more effective participatory and experimental by:

- Using diagrams, chart, models, OHP, LCD projectors.
- Seminar presentation by students.
- Focused group discussions.
- Participation in virtual classes.
- Power point presentation by students/teachers.
- Hands on training during lab sessions.
- Organizing guest lectures.
- Inter-disciplinary activities.
- Presenting case study.
- Visits to relevant industries and institutions.
- Field visits/study tour.
- IQAC encourages and provides facilities for ICT enabled teaching using interactive boards.
- Students are trained to use internet and on-line study material.
- Teachers also prepare e-study materials.
- Students submit/share their assignment on-line in e-mail created for all departments.
- Learning experience is enriched by social networking platform.

How is 'learning' made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory 2.3.4 learning activities adopted by the faculty that contribute to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

Book bank scheme are available for SC/ST and other students. Teachers provide personal books, study material to advance learners. Home assignments/mini projects on specific topics are given to develop independent learning. Teachers give CDs, DVDs to students so that they can learn at their own pace. They also learn from animations on YouTube besides routine chalk/blackboard methods. Group discussions/quiz, brain storming flip teaching is also incorporated to make teaching more students centric in some sessions. Advanced learners are asked to help their classmates. Feedback (formal and informal) is obtained from students.

Add-on certificate courses are being been started recently to give them an extra edge while searching for job in national and global market.

Support system available:

- Central library with student's friendly resources, INFLIBNET, Wi-Fi.
- Departmental library with CDs, journals, multimedia.
- Laptops and computers for teaching-learning.
- Software to teach Maths, Statistics, Chemistry, Bioinformatics.
- Smart class rooms.

What is the College policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to provide lectures / seminars for students?

IQAC invites proposals from heads of all the departments to arrange guest lectures by subject experts to be invited from other universities, industries and other academic organizations in the beginning of the academic session every year. After sanction of proposal, departments invite and arrange extension lectures as per their requirements, for UG/PG students. Departments also arrange series of lectures under Pratibha Bank Yojna.

- Eminent scientists, academicians, educators, teachers are also being invited to deliver lectures and key note address in seminars/ workshops/FDP organized by department/IQAC of the College.
- Students are also motivated and encouraged to participate in lectures series organized in various departments of the university.

2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counsellors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-socio guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted.

Yes, College has system of guiding/counseling students at various level. Several students have been benefitted from these steps undertaken.

- Teachers students mentoring is our one of the most focused program of our college.
- Students-student mentoring is also promoted. (SAMARADDHI program)
- Senior students from all streams take initiative to mentor fresh students.(DIVYA group for hostlers)
- Students are free to approach teachers/mentors any time.
- Weaker students are given remedial classes and other assistance to improve their performance, it has resulted in decrease in dropout ratio.
- Students who are academically sound are given counselling to pursue coaching for competitive examinations. PG students are guided to write research projects/reports and apply for fellowships.
- Mentors assists to sort out personal/family/emotional/gender issues of the students.
- Guidance and advice from Dr. N.K. Nagaich, Head, Dept. of Psychology is sought in specific cases.

Vivekanand Career Guidance and Counselling Cell also help students achieving in their academic and professional goals.

- To chalk out academic road map.
- To acquaint them with various career options.
- To address their problems related to stress, examination phobia, peer pressure.
- Offers training for skilled based employment.
- Coaching for various competitive examination.

Complaint boxes have been installed in the campus including hostel. Any grievance may be given in writing and dropped in complaint box. The grievances are then taken up and appropriate actions are taken.

Grievance Redressal Cell, Women Development Cell, Equal Opportunity Cell, Sexual Harassment Cell, are well-established well designed units, which take up gender related issues, academic matters, hostel accommodation, health services, library, etc., and provide solutions. Cells create healthy light environment, so that students can bring their grievances freely and frankly. If required, these cells arrange joint meetings, to discuss specific issues/cases.

Yes, College administration and IQAC are making continuous and sustained efforts to incorporate innovative teaching learning methodologies and gradually changing from teacher centered pedagogy to student centered pedagogy. Teachers also follow guidelines provided in 'Navachar Yojna' presented by Deptt of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P.

Some of these methods are:

- Science, Commerce, Home Science students are assigned project work to explore their innovative and creative skills.
- Students prepare PPT on topics assigned to them.
- Students, teachers share their quarries/solution presentations, in the mail id of their respective departments to promote e-learning.
- Interactive teaching /learning is promoted by organizing quiz, debate, role play, etc. in the departments.
- Students are encouraged to attend and participate in virtual classes.
- Use of models, charts, posters and audio video clips are used to stimulate learning in students.
- Teachers keep pace with new development in their subject.
- Seminars and extension lectures are organized regularly in all departments. It helps them gather information about latest development in their fields.
- Students are assigned various creative task such as writing reports, assignments, participation in quiz, brain storming, etc.

- Field trips, excursion exposes them to learn subject in nature.
- College library/departments subscribe journals/periodicals/newspapers. To keep track of the latest development in particular fields.
- Vivekanand career counselling cells also subscribe number of good magazines, books, periodicals for students/staff.
- Faculty members attend national/international seminars, workshop. These interaction strengthen the involvement of teachers in curricular enrichment by which students are also benefitted.
- Teachers are also invited as resource persons by other universities/ Colleges to share their knowledge, research work.
- Departments with financial support from various agencies like UGC, and IQAC organizes various in house training programs on subjects and computer skill.
- IQAC also supports faculty recharge programs for College teachers and for teachers of other Colleges.

- Computer laboratory and staff also assist teachers to prepare their study material.

- It is an open access system.
- The library is fully automated with SOUL 2.0 Software.
- E-resources are accessed through INFLIBNET with the password
- 2500 Journals and 80,000 books can be accessed on line.
- Browsing facility is attached to 13 Systems.
- Entry register, Reference register are maintained.
- Library houses some old precious books on various subjects

Continuous monitoring and evaluating mechanism is implemented.

Following steps are taken to maintain quality teaching in College

Feedback is obtained from students - the primary stakeholder, and from secondary stakeholders - the parents during parent teacher meet under Shikshak Abhivak yojnna.

Feedbacks are analyzed and correctional measured are employed.

There is a class checking committee comprising senior teachers which keeps a vigil on regularity of classes, quality of teaching and on attendance of students.

A committee nominated by Additional Director, Higher Education, Gwalior-Chambal Division also monitors teaching quality.

A selection committee scrutinizes the applications & eligible candidates are invited on merit basis for specified period

Yes, the College has comprehensive examination process meticulously followed.

- on line Payment of examination fee by the students
- Students who have paid examination fee are considered as registered candidates.
- Time table is announced.
- Admission cards to candidates are issued
- Notice of the meeting is served to discuss the process and composition of examination committees.
- The Head or the senior faculty in the Department in consultation with the Principal and Controller of Examination, appoints members of Committees for the conduction of examination in 2 or 3 shifts.
- Shift superintendent is appointed separately for all shifts.
- Necessary stationeries procured from the office of the Controller of Examination.
- Required Numbers of question paper packets are handed over to Chief Superintendent (CS).
- C.S. checks the details on question paper packets (date, class, subjects, etc.) before the Controller of Examinations and puts his signature and date on the cover.

- Manuscripts are also kept for cross verification
- Invigilators are appointed to conduct examination
- Members are enlisted to the flying squad team and normally senior faculty members to check for malpractices.

Examination process

- The examination commences on the day and time as scheduled and in those rooms where the registered number of candidates are displayed. All rooms have sufficient furniture and other facilities to accommodate candidates.
- Room invigilators will not allow the candidates to enter examination hall after half an hour from the commencement of the examination.
- Question papers and Answer books are distributed
- Before the commencement of the examination every candidate has to read a pledge printed on the back page in the answer book.
- The members of the flying squad check the examination hall and also individual candidates.
- The Principal and the Chief Controller of Examinations go round visiting the halls.
- The invigilator, after the final bell rings, collects the answer scripts and hands them over to the officials in the control room.
- C.S. then submits all answer books along with all required papers.

Post examination process

- Coding officers to code the answer books are appointed
- Answer scripts are coded and they are sent to the office of the Deputy Controller for valuation, from duly appointed examiners, by the Controller of Examination in consultation with Chief Controller of Examination.
- The Chairpersons invite faculty from the panel of examiners of the concerned department for valuation.
- The coordinator maintains a register where the name, the code number of the paper, the total number of scripts and the packet number along with the signature and date are maintained.
- The review of answer scripts are done by the external examiner or subject experts.
- The Foil/Counter foil are later handed over to the Deputy Controller.
- After the computation of CCE marks final result is prepared,
- Result is checked and approved by members of and members of Examination cell
- Results are declared and announced in the website of the college.
- Press statement is issued to newspapers regarding the announcements of the results.
- Photocopy facility of the answer script is provided to candidates on request against the submission of required fee. .
- Revaluation facility is extended.

Use of unfair means and malpractices during examinations are taken as serious offense. A committee is constituted to review the cases of Unfair means and malpractices and strict action is taken against candidate, if found guilty.

2.5.8 Has the College introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

14 Departments of the College are recognized research centers. Ph. D. Evaluation is regulated by the Jiwaji University, Gwalior to which the college is affiliated. Research Centers are authorized only to monitor the progress of the research of the students.

- 2.5.9 What efforts are made by the College to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved process and functioning of the examination division/section?
 - The College has been doing its sincere efforts to streamline its operation in the working of the office of the controller where fair, smooth and confidential work is carried.
 - College has a separate examination wing with dedicated staff and their offices are equipped with computers, printer, and internet connectivity. COE office has separate evaluation center, decoding section, strong room and automation section.
 - Examination Cell has 13 members besides Controller of Examination. There are 2 deputy controllers.
 - Examination Cell works under the guidance/supervision of the principal. Members are appointed by the principal.
 - Examination Cell has all facilities like computers. Wi-Fi access, reprographic machines, CCTV camera, digital notice boards etc. along with supporting staff to work efficiently.
 - Transparency is maintained wherever possible without disturbing the confidential aspects related to the various process of conduct of examinations.
 - Examination related software is adopted.
 - Pre and post examination process (wherever necessary) have been computerized.
 - Tamper proof Marksheets with more secured characters, hologram and photograph of the candidate has been designed and will be introduced in coming semesters.
 - Faculty and administrative staff are given training periodically regarding the conduct of examinations.

II.Periodic review is part of Examination Reform.

Total transparency and confidentiality run parallel, in the whole examination process. Student can bring their grievances in the notice of Controller of Examination after the declaration of result within stipulated period of the time.

The valued answer scripts of CCE written Test and the valued scripts of assignments are distributed to students for verification. During assignment presentation opinion about the performance is sought from all students. Internal assessment evaluation results are verified and signed by the students as a mark of her acceptance of evaluation

For semester exams there is a provision for Review/revaluation /Retotaling and/or getting photocopies of answer scripts, in case, the student is not satisfied with the evaluation. The students can bring any grievance regarding evaluation to the notice of the Controller of Examinations.

2.6. **Student Performance and Learning Outcomes**

Yes. Students are made aware of Learning outcome, objectives and job opportunities for the program during introductory classes by the subject teachers.

The office of the Controller of Examination has centralized data about the examination results of the students. The teacher goes through the data based on their outcomes and based on that the teachers find out the remedial measures that are needed to the students. In meeting of IQAC in presence of the Controller of Examinations, the reason for low outcomes are discussed in the details is recorded in the minutes book and remedial measures are taken to rectify it. Supplementary exam (ATKT) is conducted for the students those who fail in the exam.






PERCENTAGE (%) OF FACULTY GUIDING RESEARCH SCHOLAR

No, there is no provision in the institution to provide seed money to faculty for research although the College has proposed the seed money for research projects in the current session.



- The college is declared as a Tobacco free zone.
- Pollution free fuel is used in the hostels and canteen.
- English Language Skill Improvement Classes for girls by Woman Development Cell is organized in the college.
- Woman development Cell spread awareness about Female Foeticide, Gender Discrimination, Women Education and Safety of Women through Nukkad Nataks.
- Women Development Cell of the college creates awareness among girl students especially those hailing from rural areas on personal hygiene.
- Members of Women Development Cell spend time with mentally challenged woman and distribute clothes and food among them.
- The girl students are sensitized on various issues.
- To make campus more green Tree plantation is a very frequent practice by the students of NCC/ NSS
- Dr. Charanjeet Kaur, Assistant Professor Home Science, member of National Consumer Forum spread awareness of consumer rights to the girls.
- M.Sc. (Food and Nutrition) students visit Nutritional Rehabilitation Centre at Gwalior and give counseling to mothers of malnourished children.
- Cultural Activities Awareness is also by Exhibitions on Social Issues
- Workshop on Disaster Management
- Seminar on Traffic Rules every year
- Mahilaon ki suraksha and jagrookta seminar
- Self defence training programme by NSS & Sports
- Cooking, Squash, Jam Jelley preservation classes are arranged under Self employment programmes
- Eyes, Bone Density, Dental, Gynic, Skin checkups in Health Camps
- Remedial Classes for weak students

All of these activities are aimed at the holistic development of the students and for community benefit.

How does the College promote College-neighborhood network and 3.6.2 student engagement, contributing to holistic development of students and sustained community development?

The mechanism of the institute to track students' involvement in various social movements and activities is governed through its NCC, NSS Units and Women Development Cell and Red Ribbon club. Outcome:

Physical Facilities

4.1.1 How does the College plan and ensure adequate availability of physical infrastructure and ensure its optimal utilization?



The College is situated in the centre of the city and easily accessible with public transport. The infrastructure of the College is adequate to meet the requirement of its various stake holders. College provides good environment, adequate infrastructure and all the necessary facilities for curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities so that quality education is ensured.

I. Class rooms:

There are total 52 class rooms with adequate furniture, light and fans and most of them are well ventilated having capacity to accommodate 60-100 students. The College has Science, Home Science, Humanities, Law, Commerce and Management faculties. Commerce courses are offered in the morning shift (8-30 to 11-30 am) and Science, Humanities and Home Science courses are offered in noon shift (11-30 to 3-15 pm) therefore complete utilization of the existing class rooms for teaching and learning purposes is possible. There is also a provision for remedial classes in the 3rd shift (from 3-5pm). All the blocks have notice boards for dissemination of information relevant and important for the students.

II. Staff rooms:

Each department has a staffroom. Commerce and Management, Humanities, Law, Science and Home Science blocks have adequate washrooms.

III. Laboratories:

The laboratories are well equipped to cater to the need of the students `and research scholars.

4 departments are equipped with LCD projectors and 10 smart classrooms have been provided for ICT enabled teaching and learning.

Does the College have a policy for creation and enhancement of 4.1.2 infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching-learning environment? If yes, mention a few recent initiatives.

Yes. The College has a policy for creation and enhancement of infrastructure. At the end of every academic year the members of the College management (IQAC, Planning Board & Building Committee) assess the adequacy of available infrastructure. Need based expansion, renovation, updating and maintenance of buildings and other infrastructure facility is undertaken. The funds for these activities are arranged from state Government, UGC, Janbhagidari samitee and autonomous grants. New infrastructure has been created and the existing is upgraded to improve quality and efficiency in academic performance of the students.

Some initiatives taken are as follows:

College has received a grant of Rs.62, lacs under XI plan of UGC for development of infrastructure and learning resources

Infrastructure Development:

- A new girls' hostel Saraswati has been constructed having 36 rooms where 72 girls may be accommodated. The funds have been provided by UGC (80 lacs).
- A classroom for M.Sc. students is constructed in the chemistry department (UGC, 5 lacs).
- A separate building for B.B.A. is erected using autonomous fund.
- A computer lab has been established in Home Science department which has 10 computers.
- A new block in Home Science has been added to existing infrastructure.
- 14 Ramps with railings have been constructed funded by Janbhagidari samittee.
- An examination control room has been added to the existing infrastructure which is funded by autonomous grant.
- Internet and Wi-Fi connections have been provided in every department of the College.
- A toilet for differently abled students has been constructed
- Microbiology Lab is under construction
- SBI Kiosk center is sanctioned by SBI.
- M.P.Online kiosk is also sanctioned.

Renovation:

- Rooms 8A and 8B to be used as common rooms by students have been renovated.
- Existing furniture has been repaired.
- Rain water harvesting technique has been used to conserve rain water flowing from terrace of Kaveri hostel.
- Grey water recharge is done to conserve waste water.

College has received Rs.26 lacs at present under XII plan. Several new construction plans are in consideration and as soon as College receives additional funds the proposed construction plans will be executed.

4.1.3 Does the College provide all departments with facilities like office room, common room, and separate rest rooms for women students and staff?

All the departments have a separate staff room and wash rooms. Two common rooms with wash rooms are available for students in the premises.

4.1.4 How does the College ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students/staff with disabilities?

The College is in the process of establishing necessary infrastructure for the differently abled students to ensure they have comfortable stay.14 ramps with railings have been constructed mostly at every entry and exit points to avoid any inconvenience to them. A wheel chair is available within the premises to be used whenever necessary which is kept in NSS room. During the examination extra attention is paid to so that seating arrangement is made on ground floor and any other assistance is provided if needed. A toilet for differently abled persons has been constructed.

Equal Opportunity Cell has been established in the College to address the needs of the differently abled students. Knowledge regarding various Govt. Schemes available for differently abled students and employees has been provided to the target group by inviting experts from department of Social Justice and Welfare.

How does the College cater to the residential requirements of students? Mention

Recreation facility -

College has a Gymnasium which is used by resident students as well. Narmada and Kaveri hostels have a common recreation room where television is available. A few indoor games viz. chess and carom is also available. Magazines and News papers in Hindi and English including employment news are made available to the girls. Yoga classes organized by sports dept. are open for resident students. Computer with Wi-Fi facility has also been provided to them in the recreation room.

4.1.6 How does the College cope with the health related support services for its students, faculty and non-teaching staff on the campus and beyond?

Medical and emergency services are available within easy reach. A closely linked Govt. Kamla Raje Hospital is situated just opposite the College campus where medical facilities are available for the students. Besides this the College has number of nursing homes and hospitals at walking distance. Girls residing in hostels have the doctors in the close vicinity of the College who are available 24x7. First aid kit is available in the College. Periodical health check-up is conducted for all the students.

In College library as well, facility of Wi-Fi is available for both students and teachers' thus maximum students, research scholars and teachers are benefited. Soft copies of Thesis and educational CDs in various subjects have been made available in the Library to be used by students and scholars.

- Most of the departments prepare study materials for students using eresources.
- Carrier Guidance Cell is equipped with 10 computers and it encourages students to use the lab. The students can search employment options online. They are also provided facility to prepare their project work and power point presentations in this computer lab.
- Students are provided information about online resources available for effective learning.
- INFLIBNET facility is available in library as well as teaching departments.
- Some class rooms and laboratories are equipped with multimedia projectors and necessary computer facility to help students and faculty access internet and online e-resources.

- Students prepare power point presentation and share /exchange with other students using mail which promotes sharing of knowledge.
- The College has provided LCD projectors to 4 departments to be used as effective teaching aid. Soon most of the departments will acquire this facility.
- A National workshop on 'in-silico tools and techniques in Bioinformatics, one week hands on training for teachers on 25th to 30th August 2014 by Department of Botany and Zoology was organized
- IT Cell of the College conducted a training program in which the staff of the College participated and acquired computer operation and working knowledge of computer.

There is no separate Estate officer/other officer is appointed to perform the duties of maintenance of infrastructure. Although the local section of PWD is established in the campus to perform the duties related to maintenance of infrastructure. When infrastructure maintenance is required the concerning Heads of the Department report it to Principal. Principal's office writes to the Executive Engineer of Local PWD section who inspects maintenance work and gives estimated budget. The proposal of maintenance work with estimated budget is sent the government and government releases the fund to PWD for maintenance.

4.4.2. Does the College appoint staff for maintenance and repair? If not, how are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipment maintained? Give details.

- The College has made sufficient arrangements for the maintenance and repair of the available infrastructure, though separate staff is not appointed for this purpose.
- Inputs are taken from Head of the Departments and IQAC Cell and submitted to the Principal. The College makes sure that necessary funds are allocated and utilized for the maintenance. College has appointed the staff for maintenance of the College premises which includes garden, cleanliness of building, water supply, upkeeps of

office furniture and other. Minor repair work is done by the College employees or services are outsourced. Technical support is hired from outside for the major faults or repairs. The maintenance and development of the campus is under taken with the help of the Public Works Department.

- For maintenance of basic amenities like electricity, lights, fans and wiring an electrician is deputed by RES and the office has been set up at the main gate of the College.
- To maintain laboratory equipments suppliers are contacted to provide services while simpler instruments are maintained by calling up local mechanics and technicians as required.
- Reprographic facilities like printer, Photocopier etc. are maintained through AMC.
- Electronic items like CCTV camera, T.V., water cooler, water purifiers and refrigerators are maintained by hiring local services.
- Wi-Fi facility and telephone lines are maintained by BSNL local office as they are the service providers.
- CCTV camera and Computers are kept in working conditions with the help of computer department and IT Cell which includes hardware and soft ware related problems. However, some systems and accessories like printers and scanners have to be repaired by employing technicians from local market or company workshop.
- PWD engineer looks after maintenance and repair of infrastructure.

Avagaman Suvidha Yojna – This is a State Government Policy to promote more participation of adjoining areas. A special travelling allowance is given to the students.



Differently able students (ii)



Yes, the College has a student council. The Student council has a significant role in coordinating the key activities of the college.



- IQAC: the faculty members of the university worked as an advisor in Advisory Board of Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the College.

Jiwaji University, Gwalior also provides opportunity to faculty members of the College to get experience of leadership in different areas, such as :

- University may also appoint the Principal of the College as member of Executive Council of the university.
- It also appoints faculty members of the College in the governing body of different private Colleges to look after their administrative/academic matters as representative of University.
- The teachers of the College also nominated as Dean of the faculty of the University. Senior member of the department of Home Science is appointed the Dean of Home Science in the University.
- The faculty members of the College are nominated as convener or member of the Examination Committee of the University.
- The faculty members of the College also nominated as manager of University cultural teams.

- Teachers of the College are also appointed on the committee constituted for approval/continuation of affiliation.
- Many of our teachers appointed as Convener or member of Affiliation Committees.
- The Sports Officer of the College appointed as Coach or Manager of University sports teams.
- The faculty members of the College also nominated as manager of University cultural teams.
- Many of our teachers worked as member of Flying Squad of the university examination.
- The Faculty members of the College also appointed as convener or member of selection committee for appointment of teacher under section 28/17.
- The faculty members are also nominated as member or convener of Central Valuation Cell of the university examination.

How does the College groom the leadership at various levels?

To groom leadership among the faculty members, College administration follows the leadership system at various levels, such as:

- The senior most faculty of each department works as academic as well as administrative Head of the department with the assistance of other members of the department.
- The College appoints faculty members in different committees to work independently. Head of the Institution always give weightage towards teacher's suggestions and provided suitable environment, so that their leadership may groom.

6.1.9 Has the College evolved any strategy for knowledge management? If yes, give details.

- The College has a PRATIBHA BANK, in which retired and ex professors are members. They delivered guest and extension lecture for betterment of knowledge of the students
- Senior and meritorious students give guidance to the junior students. Students related to Women Development Cell also taken grammar classes of their juniors.
- E-library and Network Resource Centre give facility to the faculty and students to access web knowledge and this practice enable them to generate global competence with updation of their knowledge.

Contributing to national development: A.

This Institution is more than 75 years old and witness national movement for Indian independence. It was sole organization for women higher education in Gwalior State before independence. The teachers of this College are grooming the girl students of Gwalior and adjoining areas to serve the nation and contribute to its development. The College observes the days of national importance like Independence Day, Republic Day, Swami Vivekanand Jayanti, Gandhi Jayanti, Ambedkar Jayanti, Shaheed Diwas, Balidan Diwas etc. to develop patriotism in the students. NCC, NSS and JAGRITI are such organizations which provide platform to the cadets and volunteers for serving nation through social responsibilities.

В. **Fostering global competencies among students:**

The College organized academic and research program on global importance to fostering global competencies among students. Environmental pollution and its remedies, Disaster management, Sensitization of women are the global topics of competence building.

C. **Inculcating a value system among students**

The College has personality Development Cell, Ethical Excellence Cell, N.S.S. and N.C.C. for inculcating a value system among students. These cells organize value oriented program like seminar, workshop, exhibition, various competitions and extension lectures from which students are benefitted in large scale.

D. **Promoting use of technology:**

The College has sufficient ICT facilities like Internet broadband, Wi-Fi, Smart Class Rooms, LCD projectors, Digital Display Board, E-Library, E-news letter etc. in the campus and the faculty members and students have liberty to utilize modern technology.

Open feedback sessions and Discussion Forum for faculty and for students are the platforms for interaction on academic and research problems to improve their excellence level. The Review committee of University Grants Commission for extension of Autonomy has visited the Institution in 12-14th March 2015 and on the basis of the recommendation of Review committee UGC has extended our Institution's autonomous status till 2021. The College has made effective efforts in implementing the suggestions given by expert committee in its report, 2007, hence the College achieved extension for Autonomy for nine years i.e.2012 to 2021. The present Review committee has submitted its report directly to UGC and during meeting with principal, H.O.D. and staff members, and committee suggested some measures which are to be implemented by Institution for betterment and improvement of its Autonomy, such as:

- Strong room for examination cell,
- Establishment of student help centre
- Establishment of Center Advanced Research Lab
- Establishment of canteen
- More smart class rooms
- 100% Wi-Fi campus
- Encourage the class room teaching
- Frequent transfer of teachers and non-teaching staff to be avoided.
- Attract the students and faculty in the library.
- Health care center should be established in the campus.

The College has set these suggestions as target and started the implementation on it and some of them are achieved within 6 months of report submitted by the Review committee, viz. Strong room for Examination Cell, 100% Wi-Fi campus, Establishment of canteen, Health Care Center, and campus on 100% surveillance.

6.2 **Strategy Development and Deployment**

- The availability of infrastructure creates an environment that helps in teaching learning process.
- The different academic bodies meet regularly to find out the strategy for enhancement of teaching and learning.
- Upgradation of the existing program.
- Introduction of new courses and subjects.

- Introduction of new skill based certificate courses.
- Establishment of E-library.
- Automation of library.
- Promote ICT based teaching and learning

Research & Development:

The College is aware to develop research ability among the faculty members and research scholars. College has taken steps for the betterment of research and development in following way:

- An international peer reviewed journal 'Creative Discourse' is started from July, 2014 for promoting research work.

- Microbiology Lab is under construction
- Boundary wall of College campus has been rejuvenated and it is funded by UGC in Rejuvenation scheme.

Grievances and complaints are placed before the respective committee or cell and solved in such a manner that promotes better stakeholder-relationship. After redressal of complaints College administration takes necessary action immediately.

The College administration analyzes the feedback on 5 points excellent, very good, good, average and bellow average and takes essential action on analysis report.

The affiliating University helps the College in many ways:

- The university nominates its faculty members as an expert of Governing Body, Academic Council, Board of Studies and IQAC of the College and they give valuable suggestions for the development of the College.
- It grants affiliation to new courses and subjects for academic development.
- The University is a monitoring agency and it arranges mock inspection to assess the development of the College.

- It grants approval for new courses and subjects.

How does the College get feedback from non-teaching, teaching, parents and alumni on its functioning and how it is utilized.

Yes, the College gets feedback from its stakeholders viz. teaching, nonteaching staff, students, parents, visitors and alumni during the meetings about the functioning and development of the College. The feedback is discussed regularly in the meeting of IQAC, H.O.D. and staff council and its suggestions and outcomes will be the part of the plan of the College. The College administration tried its level best to implement it accordingly.

6.2.10 Does the College encourage autonomy to its academic departments and how does it ensure accountability?

Yes, the College encourages autonomy to academic departments in following way:

The academic departments may enhance the curriculum upto 20 % in the syllabus, framed by the Central Board of Studies or Jiwaji University, Gwalior on the basis of local need.

- The departments can introduce new subject or course or certificate course as per local requirement.
- The departments are also free to organize seminar, workshop, conference, symposium, exhibition, study tour, field work and extension lectures etc.

6.2.11 Does the College conduct performance auditing of its various departments?

Yes, the College has Academic Audit Cell for performance auditing of the various departments. Every department of the College maintains their academic as well as research development records, which is examined by the A.A.C. The performance of the department is estimated on the basis of the targets set by the IQAC and Board of Studies before session starts.

Another performance auditing is related with faculty members, who maintain the teacher diary and attendance register. The teacher diary is examined by the Head of the Departments and Principal respectively as internal auditor and the Principal of the lead College examined it as external auditor. Performance of teacher is estimated on the basis of student attendance. Teacher's performance is also decided on the basis of examination results.

The Academic audit is also done by IIM Indore on January, 2015 and audit report is submitted directly to the commissioner, deptt. of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P.

6.3 **Faculty Empowerment Strategies**

6.3.1 What efforts are made by the College to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff?

The College has made efforts to enhance the professional development of teaching staff, such as:

- Teachers are encouraged to attend the orientation and refresher programs.
- Teachers are deployed as an ambassador teacher in other Colleges for the teaching skill orientation.
- Teachers are motivated to participate faculty development program and they are relieved for program organized by various govt. Colleges of M.P. and other organisations for the faculty development program.
- Teachers are encouraged to organize seminar, workshop, conferences to experience the academic and research updation.
- Teachers participate in seminars, workshops, conferences regularly.

- Teachers are sent to R.S.V.P. Naronha Administration Academy of Pradesh, Bhopal for various professional development program.
- Computer learning also provided to the teaching staff by the IT Cell of the College.

The following efforts are also made for non-teaching staff for professional development by the College:

- Non-teaching staff are sent to departmental training program for enhancement of professional skills.
- The College arranges lectures and short term program for professional skill enhancement.
- Non-teaching staff are also sent to R.S.V.P. Naronha Administration Academy of Madhya Pradesh, Bhopal for various professional development program, like Office management, Official Process, Right to information, Accounts and Audit training etc.
- Computer learning also provided to the non-teaching staff by the IT Cell of the College.

6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of the Performance Appraisal Reports? List the major decisions.

As per the norms of the department of higher education, Govt. of M.P. teachers submit their PBAS format as confidential report to the principal and it is evaluated by the IQAC. Since it is a Govt. College, PBAS is sent to Commissioner, Deptt. of Higher Education through Additional Director, Gwalior-Chambal Division. Though outcomes are confidential and not disclose however adverse remarks are communicated to the concerned teaching, nonteaching staff directly by the government. But the College administration inspires its staff to improve their performance. The confidential report of non-teaching staff is assessed by the principal and it is also sent to Commissioner, Deptt. of Higher Education through Additional Director, Gwalior-Chambal Division. Promotion and scales are awarded by the government on the basis of appraisal reports of teaching and non-teaching staff.

What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The College is introducing innovations in its existing practices to make its vision a reality.

7.1 **Environment Consciousness**

7.1.1 Does the College conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

Educational institutes can make broad impact on the world around them. These are in unique position to be leaders in pursuing environmentally sustainable solutions. Govt. K.R.G. Post Graduate Autonomous College, Gwalior expresses its commitment of sustainability in many ways. College campus is spread across 13 acres and has lush green environment. From the entrance, there is a well-laid tar road connecting all the blocks in the campus. The front-view garden, beautiful blossoms, green fencing plants, basketball court, surrounded by shady trees, with the statue of Goddess Sarasvati contribute to the pleasant and serene ambience of the college. The College campus is an important landmark in the city chiefly because of its architecture of Scindia Dynasty and greenery. It provides a feast to the eyes, the mind, and the soul of any visitor. It is so enchanting that students don't leave the campus even after their classes. They love sitting in the lawns chatting with their friends, reading books, writing assignments, holding group discussions. College has taken a number of positive steps to improve its environment quality.

College conducts internal green audit since 2013 and makes efforts to maintain ecofriendly atmosphere in the campus. To maintain ecofriendly ambience a 10 point program is followed. 'Know Green and Think Green' is promoted in the campus. Measures to water conservation and water wastage are taken care of.

- Use of CFL (LED) bulbs in place conventional bulbs. Conservation of resources by the following ways is adopted.
- Reduce→Reuse→Recycle.
- Efforts are done for Carbon neutrality by maintaining additional greenery.
- Turning of lights/bulbs and other appliances when not in use.
- Construction of well ventilated, illuminated classrooms.
- Environmental studies have been made mandatory for students.

- Minimum use of energy is the basis of energy conservation.
- Notices have been pasted to reduce the wastage of electricity.
- Solar water heaters and solar panels have been installed in chemistry laboratories and in hostels.
- College has crafted manual of 'Environmental Audit' with appropriate methodology and 09 significant 'SUSTAINABILITY INDICATORS'.
- It significantly contributes to protect the environment through JAGRATI program.

Some of the activities include:

- College observes earth day, environment day, Biodiversity day and promotes policy to keep College clean and green.
- Campus has been declared tobacco/smoking free zone. Use of these products is punishable act.
- Use of plastic, polythene has been restricted.
- Workshops/Seminars are organized and environmental issues are discussed.
- Students and staff are encouraged to use public vehicle.
- To maintain the greenery, frequent plantation program is done.
- On every Saturday, cleanliness drive is observed.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus ecofriendly?

* Energy conservation

- All the class rooms are adequately ventilated and well lighted.
- Volunteers of JAGRATI group and other students and are instructed to switch off the lights, fans, computers and other Electronic appliances when they are not in use.
- The dry leaves and the waste papers are not burnt but they are buried in the soil itself and Leaf litter from the campus is used as organic manure.
- Energy consumption in the hostel is closely monitored by the wardens and hostel staff.
- Members of "DIVYA" train their juniors to minimize the use of natural resources.
- Fluorescent tube lights and Tungesten bulbs are being replaced with CFL and LED lights.
- As alternative energy resources solar lamps, and solar geysers have been installed.

* Use of renewable energy

- Solar water heaters system have been installed in hostels and in chemistry labs.
- College is planning to increase number of water heaters and also solar panels for electricity requirement will be installed.

* Water harvesting

One water harvesting system is functioning near girls' hostel.

- LPG cylinders are being used in laboratories, hostels and canteen.

- Energy consumption has been included as sustainability indicator in Environmental Audit to asses and minimize energy consumption.

* Plantation

- College in its policy has fixed to plant minimum 50 plants every year. Sapling are obtained from forest department and NGOs.
- NSS volunteers, NCC cadets alongwith JAGRATI group take keen interest in tree plantation. They organize special programs for plantation of trees within the campus every year.
- College NSS Units undertake tree plantation in the adopted villages.
- JAGRATI and DIVYA group take care of new saplings and nurture them to grow.

* Hazardous waste management

- The college avoids the use of severe corrosive chemicals in the practical. Teachers monitor that minimum quantity chemicals are purchased and used to save expiry and disposal.
- Solid wastage in the chemistry lab is collected separately and disposed of carefully without causing any harm to the inmates of the lab.



- ♦ Building is not sufficient. Moot court room and legal aid clinic is also not upto the norms.

OPPORTUNITIES:

CHALLENGES:

Post-accreditation Initiatives

Criterion I: Curricular Planning and Development

NAAC Observations in Cycle 2

- A few of the faculty are represented in university BOS and other academic bodies.
- Value added courses need to be introduced in order to promote citizenship roles.
- The freedom of using autonomy to reformulate 20% syllabus needs to be optimally utilized.
- More electives must be introduced in the core subjects.
- Remedial courses for slow learners.
- Formal and efficient system of feedbacks from the stakeholders need to be introduced.
- The Curriculum needs to be updated considering the developments in the respective disciplines.

- Most of the faculty members are represented in BOS of parent university and other academic bodies. Some are also members of BOS and other academic bodies of other universities.
- Though Value added courses could not be started but some short term Value added programs are organized in order to promote citizenship roles.
- BOS of various subjects using autonomy to reformulate 20% syllabus.
- Since the College has to follow the curricula approved by the Central Board of Studies and Jiwaji University, Gwalior, though some departments introduced more electives in the core subject. Department of History introduced a Dissertation paper in M.A. IV semester.
- Remedial classes are arranged for slow learners.
- The feedback obtained from the stakeholders in formal and informal both way and it is analyzed by the Grievance Redressal Cell of IQAC. The management has taken appropriate steps for the development in all fields of the Institution on the basis of the analysis report presented by the cell. The practice of open feedback session is also helpful for the betterment of the College.

Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

NAAC Observations in Cycle 2

- Advanced learners need to be further motivated.
- Bridge courses for educationally disadvantaged students need to be introduced.
- Class room lectures need to be augmented with modern teaching aids and seminars.
- Only few lectures have availed faculty development programmes and 15% have served as resource persons in seminars/workshops.
- The teachers need to be motivated to attend and organize seminars, workshops and refresher courses.
- 50% of paper setting outside the University for PG papers, and Central valuation is introduced for UG papers.
- An effective formal system of continuous evaluation needs to be introduced.
- The answer books of CCE need to be shown to the students.
- Evaluation of internship needs to be formalized.
- Teachers of a few departments are playing active role in showcasing their department beyond classroom boundaries.
- Few teachers enjoy national recognition.

- The College recognizes advanced learners for motivation.
- The Orientation course is organized in the beginning of the session.
- Ten Smart Class Rooms are developed in the College and teachers take classes with modern technology.
- Teachers are encouraged for participating in faculty development programmes. Twenty percent of teachers have served as resource persons in national and international seminars/workshops.
- The teachers are always motivated to attend and organize seminars, workshops and refresher courses, thus teachers participated in around 2000 seminars, workshops and other academic and research programs during the assessment period.
- Many modes like assignment, seminar, written test, group discussion, quiz etc. are introduced for continuous evaluation.
- The students are allowed to show their answer books of CCE.
- The provision of internship is withdrawn by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P.
- The College have many active teachers who are playing active role in showcasing their department beyond classroom boundaries
- Few teachers still enjoy national recognition.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

NAAC Observations in Cycle 2

- Faculty needs to be encouraged for participation in conferences/ seminars/ workshops
- Faculty needs to be further motivated for writing major projects and publication of results in reputed journals
- Research committee needs to be made more functional
- Only few faculty members are engaged in research and 46 minor research projects and 2 major research projects have been sanctioned
- National and International Collaborations need to be strengthened for improving the quality of teaching and research
- Small percentage of staff are actively engaged in research while others need to be motivated
- The College may initiate consultancy services for resource generation, women/s empowerment and neighborhood development.
- The College promotes extension activities through involvement of students in three NSS and two NCC units.
- The organization of NSS camps in villages dealing with issues like women's empowerment and social awareness needs to be enhanced
- The College needs to extend the collaborations at regional and at national level to enhance educational services and research activities.
- Interdepartmental collaborations within the College is to be encouraged
- Publications by staff are worth mentioning.

- Eighty percent of teachers have participated in conferences/ seminars/ workshops
- 20 Minor and 02 Major projects run by the teachers and some teachers published their results of project in reputed journals
- The College has constituted a Research Development Cell and it is more functional. Publication of International Journal, Organizing seminar, workshop and faculty development programs, encouraging teachers for research work are chief functions of the cell.
- The College promotes extension activities through involvement of students in three NSS and two NCC units. The extension activities are organized in both way on campus and off campus.
- The College has taken initiative to go for MOU with some reputed Institutions and industries for enhancement of educational services and research activities.

- Interdepartmental collaborations within the College is also encouraged, thus Department of Zoology and Botany, Department of Hindi and Urdu organized some workshops in collaboration.
- During assessment period department Economics is recognized as research center, now 14 Departments of the College have been recognized as research centers by the Jiwani University. The inspection of Zoology department is also conducted by the University and recognition letter is still awaited.
- Publications of research work is always encouraged by the RDC and nearly one thousand research papers, research articles, chapters in books and anthology are published by the 70 % of teachers during assessment period.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

NAAC Observations in Cycle 2

- Maintenance of infrastructure needs priority attention. Classrooms require proper ventilation.
- Drinking water facilities and hygienic toilets must be made available in more locations on campus in view of the growing numbers of students.
- The students need to given an orientation for the use of library facility including easy access.
- The College library needs to make optimum use of INFLIBNET/DELNET facilities.
- The computer facilities in the College are inadequate considering the student strength, range of subjects offered and research centers.
- The College needs to enhance the usage of ICT for preparation of teaching and learning material
- The College needs a functional health care centre with facility of visiting doctors.
- The College has minimal instruments maintenance facility which needs augmentation

- The College building is under supervision of PWD and annual maintenance of infrastructure is done by this agency. Class rooms of the College have proper ventilation.
- The College has provided proper drinking water facilities and hygienic toilets to the students. Some new toilets are also constructed.
- Students of the College are oriented to use of library facility including easy access.
- Central Library of the College library got linkage with INFLIBNET and provided its password to teachers ,research scholars of departments

and Students to make optimum use of INFLIBNET/ DELNET facilities.

- The College framed a ICT policy in 2013 and decided to develop IT infrastructure in the Institution. In accordace 150 computers are working in all the academic departments, research centers, administrative offices and other sections. The Student and computer ratio 60:1 is now giving more opportunity to students and staff to avail the IT facility.
- The College has health care center with facility of visiting doctors.
- AMC system for maintenance of instruments and equipments is adopted by the College.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

NAAC Observations in Cycle 2

- The College needs to have an efficient system to monitor student progression by maintaining the record and profile of the students.
- During last five years, a few students qualified for NET/SLET. This area needs attention.
- The College needs to encourage the faculty participation in academic and personal counseling
- Students' enthusiasm in participation in curricular and extracurricular activities is noticeable.
- The ambitious and skill oriented students need to be further motivated

- The College has Nodal agency for online admission, which monitor all activities regarding admission and student progression with the help of various other committees constituted for each faculty. This practice developed an efficient system to monitor student progression by maintaining the record and profile of the students.
- The PG departments of the College are providing guidance and classes for NET/SLET.
- The College follows student mentoring system. The academic and personal counseling are providing by every teacher. The studentsteacher ratio for mentoring is 60:1. The College needs to encourage the faculty participation in academic and personal counseling
- The academic departments, teachers and IQAC always motivate to the ambitious and skill oriented students.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

NAAC Observations in Cycle 2

- The mission statement and the goals of the Institution need to be publicized and strengthened
- The administrative and financial management needs to be computerized
- Keeping in view of the large number of students more faculty positions need to be created
- The Institution has adequate budget to cover day to day expenses
- The College needs to generate resources with the help of its alumnae, MPs and MLAs, corporate houses and even economically sound parents, for College development

Post-accreditation initiatives taken by the Institution

- The Vision, mission statement and the goals of the Institution are reframed and displayed on hording as well as on website of the College. The College management and administration are keeping the Vision and objectives in their mind at the time of framing policy, plan or rules for the development of the College.
- All the sections of the administrative and financial management have computers and follows online system of administration.
- 4 posts are redeployed in the department of Physics by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P. The IQAC is planning to prepare a detailed proposal for creating more faculty positions according to the large number of students.
- The College is still seeking to generate resources with the help of its alumnae, MPs and MLAs, corporate houses and even economically sound parents, for College development.

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices

NAAC Observations in Cycle 2

- The IQAC needs to be strengthened and systemized for quality improvement in teaching, research and administration
- Value addition courses need to be introduced for enhancement of quality
- Stakeholder relationship needs to be strengthened
- Formal organizations for strengthening relationship with the stake holders need to be established

Post-accreditation initiatives taken by the Institution

- The IQAC of the College has representation from stakeholders like alumnae, students, teachers, administration, industries etc. The office of IQAC of is also well equipped with the facility of computer, printers, internet facility with Wi-Fi facility, power backup system, AV system etc. It has also a conference room for organizing meetings of IQAC and other related committees, cells and clubs. To prepare projected plan, action plan, to put up it before Academic Council and Jan-Bhagidari Samiti for approval, to make sure its execution and to monitor properly the all activities which are organizing for the enhancement of the quality of the Institution.
- Some Value added courses are proposed and have been approved by Academic Council of the College and some programs and lectures related with these topics are organized by the College for the enhancement of quality.
- Alumnae Association, Staff Club, Staff Welfare Cell, Student Welfare Cell are active agencies to strengthen Stakeholder relationship. Discussion Forum and Teacher-Parents Meet are also helpful for this purpose.

Recommendations given during NAAC- 2nd Cycle for Quality Enhancement of the Institution

Recommendation I

Personality development classes, soft skill development courses, coaching classes for civil services and competitive examination need to be introduced

The College has constituted a Personality Development Cell and Skill Development Cell for the purpose of providing coaching classes for civil services and competitive examination and classes for personality development to the students. The College management and IQAC arranged many programs and special classes for this motive through Swami Vivekanand Rojgar Margdarshan Kendra (Career Counseling Cell), Personality Development Cell, Placement Cell and Skill Development Cell.

Recommendation II

Participation of students in sports and extra-curricular activities be encouraged

Sports department, Cultural Club and Literary Clubs made serious efforts for encouraging student to participate in sports and extra-curricular activities. Around 10% students are taking part in sports competitions and extra-curricular activities and College has received number of medals and awards at University level, State Level and National Level competitions. Some students are pride for this Institution for representing in international events also.

Recommendation III

Well equipped and properly maintained Gymnasium

Gymnasium of the College is now well equipped and properly maintained and students and staff members are benefitted. The schedule for students and staff members is also framed for proper use of Gymnasium.

Recommendation IV

Participation of women lecturers in campus governance in a women's College like this be enhanced

The participation of women teachers in campus governance is enhanced during assessment period. The women teachers have been appointed as conveners, coordinators and members of various committees, cells and clubs. Now around 80% of women staff are involved in decision making bodies like Academic council, IQAC, Janbhagidari Samiti and Executive committees and cell like Academic Cell, Examination Cell, RUSA Cell etc.

Recommendation V

The Janbhagidari Samiti needs representation from students, parents, alumnae etc.

The concept and manual of the Janbhagidari Samiti was issued by Dept. of Higher Education, Govt. of M.P. and all rules and regulations related with this body are framed and monitored by the State Govt. There is no provision for representation from students, parents, alumnae etc. in the structure of the Janbhagidari Samiti although the College management included one parent and one alumnae in this Samiti.

Recommendation VI

Sanitation and maintenance of class rooms, toilets, hostels needs improvement

In the wide campus of the College, management has taken suitable action for maintaining the sanitation in class rooms, toilets, hostels and open area. The College staff and students take part in cleanliness drive of 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan' on every Saturday. MCG (Municipal Corporation of Gwalior) also helps this College to clean the toilets and sewage lines for time to time.

Recommendation VII


Campus area network to be installed for providing better internet services to students and staff




Recommendation VIII


